HONORS GO TO TRACY

FIRST IN VANDERBILT TRIAL

Driver of a Locomobile Covers the Course of 297 Miles in 5:27:45.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Joseph Tracy and his flying eighty-horse-power Locomobile carried off the chief honors in the Vanderbilt Cup elimination race today. Covering the 297.1-mile-course in five hours twenty-seven minutes forty-five seconds, or at an average rate of 54.65 miles an hour or about two miles an hour less than Dingley made in his Pope-Toledo last year.

The race was pulled off at 12:50 p. m. The American team in the big race on Oct. 6 will be the Locomobile, Thomas, Haynes, Pope-Toledo and Christie cars, these cars being the winners of the first five places in the order named.

The performance of the Thomas cars was rather disappointing, as they were even-money favorites against the field, and only one of the three cars, the one driven by Leblon, qualified.

So far as the other contestants were concerned, the Matheson car went out of the running on the first round when a bursting tire caused it to collide with a telegraph pole, while the Oldsmobile had carburetor troubles on the same ground, which practically put it out of the running.

Race Is Disappointing.
Taken all in all the race was rather a disappointing one from the spectators' viewpoint, as half of the contestants were out of the running after the first lap. For the next three rounds it was a neck-and-tuck race for the lead between the Pope-Toledo, the Thomas and the Locomobile, but on the fourth round trouble killed the chances of the Pope-Toledo. On the ninth round trouble caused the Thomas car to drop behind and the Locomobile finished practically alone.

There was a strong easterly wind blowing when the cars drew up to the starting line. Out of fifteen cars entered in the race only twelve started, including three Thomas cars, three Frayer-Millers, the Pope-Toledo, Locomobile, Matheson, Christie, Haynes and Oldsmobile. The absentees were the Apperson, Maxwell and B. L. & M. cars.

The officials, it is said, refused to allow the Maxwell people to start their touring car. The Oldsmobile was the first away at 6 o'clock and the others followed at one minute intervals. All got away in good shape except the Thomas cars, which had trouble in starting.

The race had scarcely started at 6:15 when it was seen that the Callios and Leblon Thomas cars were in trouble. Lee Frayer was reported in trouble with his clutch in Roslyn and never did complete the round. Then Tracy did trouble in the second round at Westbury, which caused him several minutes, and this, by the way, was the only trouble he had all day.

Crowd Greets Lytle.

And then came the news that the Matheson machine had collided with a telegraph pole. A few moments later the waving of red flags and the cry of "car coming" brought the crowd to its feet to cheer Lytle and his Pope-Toledo, which passed the line at 6:32.

Christie was second, 32 seconds behind the leader. Leblon was third and Beldon in a Frayer-Miller fifth. The order of the cars on the first round and their time follows:

INDIANA TEAMS IN CLASH

Contest Between Varsity and Scrubs Shows Forward Pass Is to Be Used.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Sept. 22.—The first real football of the season under the new rules was witnessed here today when the Indiana varsity and freshmen teams met on Jordan Field in a good scrimmage. The first eleven scored twice on the scrubs, the first time with ease, but after that the ball seasawed back and forth across the field in the way that many think will characterize the game of football under the 1906 regulations.

One thing that was evident from the practice this afternoon was the fact that the forward pass will, in all probability, be used a great deal this fall. This new feature seems to be one big factor in making the sport interesting as it ever was. Many things are possible by its use, and the variations of the forward pass promise to lend an element of uncertainty and excitement that will keep the spectators aroused in the same old way.

The use of the forward pass by the Varsity this afternoon resulted in a gain of about twenty-five yards and helped make the first touchdown. This, followed by a long quarter-back run by speedy Capt. "Bunny" Hare and terrific plunges through the scrub line, carried the oval across the goal line for the coveted points.

Play Is Ragged.
The contest was anything but a polished exhibition of the game of football, as there was much fumbling, aimless scuffling and the speed was not exciting. However, there were several brilliant runs and tackles, in which Walker, scrub half, Capt. Hare and Eddy Boyle, coach of the freshmen team, figured, that brought cheers from the large crowd of students that filled the bleachers.
