

NAVY PROVES HARD FOE FOR CRIMSON

Midshipmen Hold Harvard to 6 to 6 Score in a Stubborn Contest.

MORE ON FORWARD PASS

Millers Do the First Damage, but Can Not Hold Their Opponents.

BOSTON, Oct. 24.—The Navy and Harvard football teams played each other to a standstill at the Naval Academy this afternoon, the final score being 6 to 6. From the standpoint of football of a variegated sort, the midshipmen outplayed their opponents. When the first half ended there had been a battle royal, resulting in the blue and gold crossing the crimson line within ten minutes after play commenced. Harvard had not scored nor had it been seriously near the hitherto unbreached goal line. The crimson's score was made about the middle of the second half and was on a fluke by which the mighty Nourse, from his place in the center of the Harvard line, got out and ran away with a recovered ball on a forty-yard run to a score.

There was a drizzling rain which fell in intervals during the contest. It was when Capt. Burr kicked off to Lange, just under the Navy goal posts. Navy kicked almost at once and the Midshipmen had the pigskin in midfield. Almost as the Harvard men knew what was coming the Midshipmen had worked a forward pass from Lange to Reiffenler. The blue and gold end was downed and landed the leather deep in Har-terry.

Navy Scores First.

Immediately the same signal was given the same play repeated. This time the midshipmen caught the pigskin just as it was crossing the Harvard goal line. It was not touched until he had trotted forty yards behind the goal posts. Capt. Northercott kicked a clean goal. Seven minutes had elapsed since the game was put into play. The remainder of the half was largely a punting duel. When Dalton, the Navy half back, who considered the find of the season, held Harvard back for the second half and determined, and began to try to force holes in the Navy line, and for the first time the crimson backs were to make something like consistent football. Finally Nourse bounded out from a pile of players with the coveted pigskin. One seemed to know what had happened except Lange, but before he could get out of the tangle Nourse was away with a run to the goal, sixty yards away, was never headed.
