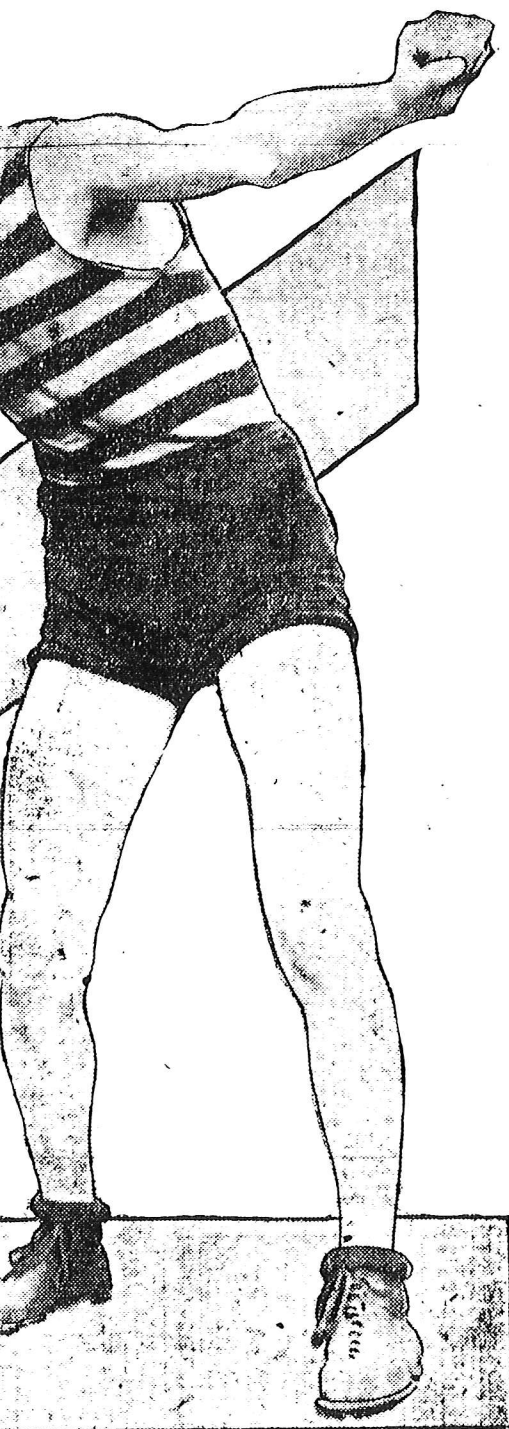

CLARK IS TO RETURN

GETS IN GAME NEXT WEEK

"Phip" Hill Appears on Jordan Field and Heckaman Arrives Monday.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Sept. 21.—Hezie Clark, left half on the Indiana University football team, left this afternoon for his home in Indianapolis. Clark intends to try to get back the first of the week, but it is very doubtful if he will be able to get away from home. McGaughey was tried out in the Indianapolis boy's position.

It will be a severe loss to the team if Clark is unable to play against Wabash. Big "Phip" Hill, sub forward last season and a regular member of the varsity in 1904, made his appearance on Jordan Field today. The big fellow is not in condition yet, but he made a strong showing and is expected to fill the hole left there.

It is now assured that Heckaman will be in Monday. He will take his old place at tackle probably. Bloom, the star end, was in suit this afternoon, but was unable to participate on account of a "charley horse." Talbott, sub quarter back last season, was not out. Williams was also tried at guard and, except for lack of weight, made a good showing.

Eddie Boyle, sub quarter back last year, has been secured to coach the freshman football team. The first year men have decided to organize, although they will not be allowed to meet teams outside of university men. Leach, the former Anderson High School star, is the most promising candidate for the captaincy of the eleven. Leach has a husky build and knows the game well.

The men were put through a long, hard signal practice today. Kicking and running down punts took most of the time. Sheldon, however, had the men run through some new plays. Cant Hara spent some time in punting, and he sent the pigskin soaring in old-time form repeatedly. The first scrimmage of the season will be held tomorrow. Bloom has been coaching the freshmen scrubs and has whipped them into fair shape.

They will give the varsity a tough struggle. The gates will be shut on all spectators, beginning next week, and secret practice will be the order of the coming two weeks before the Wabash game. The alumni team will be played next Saturday afternoon. Several old stars have signified their intention of getting into the game once more, and an interesting contest is expected.

SAD WAIL BY THE SCARLET.

Many of the Members of Cayou's Squad Suffer From Injuries.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., Sept. 21.—The first gloom of the season has settled over the Wabash football squad. Scrimmage work this afternoon caused the injuries of last year to show up on many of the players and there is much apprehension among the scarlet supporters over this fact. Several new injuries also cause alarm.

Miller, who sprained his knee in the Indiana University game, is again suffering with the member and it is likely to bother him in his work at quarter back. Hargrave, the clever little substitute quarter, has twisted his bad ankle. Stiers, the new back field candidate, who was making good, was unable to attend practice tonight, owing to the condition of the ankle he hurt last week. Hies, the star guard, injured a knee this afternoon and had to limp through practice, while Powers, the Winona Institute recruit, hurt a shoulder which is likely to interfere with his playing. Sprow, center for two years, has not been able to attend practice this week owing to the death of a grandparent in Illinois. He has been in suit only once this season. Harg, last year's full back, is positively out of the game for this season on account of an injured ankle he received in baseball last spring. The school's physician has refused to allow him to play.

CUP RACE IS ON TODAY ROLL AT A FAST

TWELVE ARE IN VANDERBILT BOWLERS SHOW GOOD

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—By far the most important automobile race ever held in this country from a manufacturers' standpoint will take place tomorrow morning. A dozen or more American machines representing the best of the manufacturers of this country can produce will race over the 29.71 miles course which will be the scene of the Vanderbilt cup race on October 6.

The original entry list included nine Thomas cars, three Frayer-Millers and one car each from Oldsmobile, Pope-Toledo, Matheson, Maxwell, Christie, Apperson, Locomobile, Haynes and B. L. & M. factories. The Locomobile and Maxwell people each built two cars, but entered only one.

Since the practice trials began accidents have overtaken the Apperson, Maxwell and Christie cars. The B. L. & M. is also a doubtful starter. With the Apperson, Maxwell and B. L. & M. cars out it will reduce the field to twelve starters. The Christie people are taking of starting one of their stock touring cars.

Many persons think that the Christie, Haynes and Matheson cars will land a place, while others who have been figuring out the dope for the past three months pick the three Thomas cars to win, with the Pope-Toledo and Locomobile next in choice.
