ITALIAN LANCIA MAKES FIRST
TRIP IN FIAT.

HE DRIVES A FAST TRIAL

NEW YORK, September 27.—Lancia, the Italian race crack, made his first trip over the Vanderbilt circuit in his Fiat racing car during the practice hours yesterday. He covered the 29.7 miles in 32:28.
