Atlanta's new \$300,000 automobile speedway will be the mecca for enthusiasts of automobile racing at the conclusion of the Vanderbilt cup race in New York on October 31. While the management of the new southern race course has found itself much in the same position as did the Indianapolis speedway management during the last summer, positive announcement has been given out that the new track will be in the best possible condition. Practice for the opening events on November 9-12 was expected to begin this week. The Atlanta track is two miles in circumference, and is the nearest approach to the Indianapolis speedway of any in the country. The National and Marmon racing teams, in New York for the Vanderbilt race, will be a part of the great automobile army that will invade the southland at the conclusion of the Long Island event.

Valuable Trophy Offered.

The \$10,000 Atlanta trophy which will be contested for during the meet in many respects resembles the Wheeler-Schebler trophy at the recent Indianapolis meet.

It is considered by experts and judges of high art to be the most magnificent automobile trophy ever designed. The trophy is six feet high and made of solid

Around the base of the trophy is the picture of an automobile race, below which are the seal of Atlanta and of the state of Georgia.
