CHARGES ARE DENIED

SHEPARD IS NOT TO PROTEST

American Who Will Drive French Car Has No Objection to Thomas Machine.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Elliot F. Shepard, the young American who will drive a 130-horse-power Hotchkiss racer Saturday as a member of the French team in the Vanderbilt Cup race, said today that there was no truth in the report that he had instigated charges against the Thomas machine, which LeBlon is scheduled to start first.

Twelve of the racing cars were out this morning during the practice hours between 5 and 7 o'clock.
