BERNHARD IS FOUND EASILY SEVENTEEN IN CUP CONTEST

Battle for the Vanderbilt Trophy.

MINEOLA, N. Y., Oct. 5 .- Seventeen high-power automobile racing machines will start tomorrow morning at 6 o'clock when the first faint streaks of day appear in the east in the third international race for the William K. Vanderbilt Jr. cup. The course, which begins at a point near Westbury on the Jericho turnpike, leads over some of the best roads of Long Island and is practically a rectangly measuring 29.21 miles along the outer-

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Lately the American and foreign drivers have been taking these turns at a speed of less than twenty-five miles an hour and there is a general belief that they will not hazard their lives or those of the spectators by greater speed in the race tomorrow.

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There are numerous long stretches where the speed of cars is expected to reach eighty miles an hour or more.

One of the German cars entered and scheduled to be driven by Foxhall Keene was officially declared out of the contest today when Mr. Keene did not "weigh in" with the rest of the field. "Several days ago a pair of cylinders in Mr. Keene's car were cracked and he was unable to secure another pair in this country.


