ALFRED G. VANDERBILT PROVES HE IS NOT DEAD

**Report that Young Millionaire Had
Been Shot Keeps Newspaper
"Dog Watches" Busy.**

NEW YORK, August 25.—"Reports of my death are greatly exaggerated," once said Mark Twain. "Me, too," chimed in Alfred G. Vanderbilt today, as he sat at breakfast at the Hotel Plaza and denied that he was a dead one. But all the same, the "dog watches" in many newspaper offices had an anxious time early this morning waiting for confirmation of the young millionaire's death.

Shortly after midnight some joker (?) telephoned to the coroner's office that young Vanderbilt had been shot twice at the Grand Union hotel, Forty-second street and Park avenue. The report added that he had been rushed to Bellevue hospital. The coroner notified the police and a squad of detectives hot-footed it to the hotel. They notified the press room and every editor in New York rushed every available man he had by elevated, by trolley, by automobile and on foot to the hotel. News agencies sent out a warning "dash" all over the country.

At the Grand Union hotel no one knew where Vanderbilt was. He had not been shot there. For hours the coroner's deputies, the police and the reporters searched. Dozens of autos containing Vanderbilt's personal friends, rushed to the hospital. He wasn't there. It was late this morning that he was found in the Plaza, where he had spent the night retiring early.
