The mammoth machine of the local company is expected to give all comers a fight for the first honors. Barney Oldfield of racing fame will be one of the leading contestants with his Peerless Green Dra-gon and the famous six-cylinder Thomas Tornado will be another of the top-notch

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The big 100 horse-power Premier stands in a class of its-own, as it is the largest air-cooled car ever built. It was constructed especially for the Vanderbilt cup races, but was disqualified owing to being eighty pounds overweight. It is a four-cylindered machine and is capable of terrific speed.

Recently at Chicago this car covered two miles in the time of two minutes and one second. It dashed over the first mile in one minute flat, but in the last half of the journey a second was lost. The machine is of a wonderful construction of concentrated power, and in the hands of Webb much is expected of it.

The races at Detroit promise to rank with the biggest events of the kind ever held in this country, and with good weather conditions many of the records are expected to be shattered. 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
