AEROPLANE BEATS AUTO, SAYS WRIGHT

On the Ground One is Covered
With Dust and May Get
Stuck

IT'S DIFFERENT IN THE AIR

Inventors Are Ready to Meet All Conditions in Trial Flight from Ft. Myer to Alexandria.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—"I would rather fly over that country in our aeroplane than ride over it in your automobile," said Wilbur Wright to a scouting party that was preparing yesterday to traverse the dusty red Virginia roads between Ft. Myer and Alexandria along the course over which his brother is soon to fly. "You are liable to get stuck somewhere, besides being covered with dust."

The course over which will be made the
official flight for which the Wrights are
preparing begins at Ft. Myer, across the
river from Washington, on a relatively
high plateau, and extends somewhat east
of south, five miles to the turning point
on a hill, westerly from Alexandria,
which will be made visible from Ft. Myer
by a small, bright yellow balloon mark-
ing its location. The country between is
broken and rather heavily wooded; but at
intervals there are open fields offering
landing places in case of emergency.

Many Scientific Problems.

This broken country involves considera-
tion of many scientific problems, and the
experiment is expected to be of unique
value in the development of aeronautics.
This will be the first flight across broken
country in a heavier-than-air machine.

Last evening's flight over the open and
level parade ground at Ft. Myer exhibited
curious effects of buildings and foliage
upon the atmospheric currents, and the
conditions over an extensive and exceed-
ingly diversified area will be studied with
great interest by the Wrights and by the
army signal corps officers.

The highest altitude yet negotiated by
the Wrights in their aeroplanes is 364
feet. Wilbur made that flight for a prize
in France. At one point in the Virginia
course, if he maintains a level flight, he
will be fully five hundred feet above the
ground.

Not In the Least Concerned.

The specifications under which the
Wrights obtained the contract with the
government under which they will, if
successful, receive \$25,000 for their ma-
chine, were generally regarded, when
they were made, as well-nigh prohibitive.
Yet, while the task is one involving un-
tried conditions, Orville Wright seems not
in the least concerned about it. He has
gone by automobile over the course twice
with the signal corps officers, and while
the country is not what he would prefer,
he seems to entertain no thought of fail-

This test is expected to demonstrate the value of an aeroplane in military service. It is not yet known whether the tendency of an operator flying across rough country will be to follow the inequalities of the topography. If Orville Wright can fly a level course he would be practically safe from the attack of imaginary troops in the valley of Four Mile run, which flows across the middle of the course. If, on the other hand, through absence of marks by which to judge and hold his level, he follows the varying heights of hill and dale, he will lose much headway and may fall of the thirty-six mile speed required by the government. He has three chances to "make good" in official trials.

Only a Few Negro Cabins.

There are comparatively few dwellings along the course and most of those are negro cabins; but the farmers who do live between Ft. Myer and Shuter Hill, the southern turning point, are filled with expectancy and view the event with varying emotions.

"When is the airship going to fly?" is the question flung at the signal officers at every opportunity.

"Will it hurt my house if it lands on the roof?" is another of the anxious questions. As one gray-bearded farmer, who grumbled yesterday about "new-fangled contraptions that wouldn't let poor folks who mind their own business have any rest," declared that he would make trouble if his new field of corn was damaged "by this blamed thing dropping in it."

Herring Needs More Time.

M. Herring, the aeroplane inventor, whose contract time for furnishing a flying machine to the government expired yesterday, it is understood, will ask for an extension of time in which to make good his contract. Today from his home in New York he called General Allen, the head of the signal corps, by long distance telephone and explained his failure to comply with his agreement was due to being ill and unable to have the machine completed in time. previous two days, the performances were inspiring. While the machine oscillated at certain points, and dipped and rose suddenly at others, it was evident from the regularity with which these things happened that they were due to the condition of the atmosphere and not to any fault of the machine.

Shortly before 6 o'clock the aeroplane was wheeled from the shed to the starting track. The damage sustained in yesterday night had been repaired by splicing a new piece to the broken skid.

How the SGRt Was Made.

After the motor had been tested the weight which gives the aeroplane its start was hoisted up and all was ready for a flight. The propellers were cranked and Orville turned on the motor. The screws whirled around at what seemed like greater speed than on the previous occasions, and as Orville climbed into his seat Wilbur put his hand on the right wing ready to run along with the machine. Nodding to his brother, Orville released the machine and it started down the track at a rapid rate. As it neared the end of the starting rail Orville turned up the forward horizontal rudders and the machine rose into the air.

It was a beautiful start and the crowd cheered heartily. Down the field the aeroplane sailed, curved gracefully about the lower end and back up the east side of the field along the edge of Arlington.

Wright was making short turns, but as he seemed to gain familiarity with the ground over which he was traveling, he increased the radius of his trips about the field. The first round was made in fifty seconds. Five times the machine circled the field.

Swings Down to Perfect Landing.

On the sixth round Wright came to earth within a few hundred feet of the starting point, completing the flight in exactly five minutes. The landing was perfect, the machine swooping down in successive glides until within a few feet of the earth when Orville pulled the

string which stops his motor and the aeroplane glided smoothly over the grass on its skids until it came to a stop.

The machine was returned to the starting apparatus, while the brothers held a consultation. Again the aeroplane was placed in position and another flight essayed. The start was as successful as the first.

In his last attempt Orville remained aloft for a few seconds more than nine minutes and encircled the field nine and one-half times. For one complete round he flew close to the ground, evidently preparing to land. This he did within two hundred feet of the aeroplane shed. During this last flight he went higher than on his previous trials, reaching a height of forty feet.

BERLIN, July 2.—According to the *Lokal Anzeiger*, Count Zeppelin intends to make an effort to reach the north pole in his airship. The emperor accepted protectorship over the undertaking, after listening to a report on the subject at Kiel by Professor H. Herzezell, of the University of Strasburg. The plan embraces a thorough exploration of the polar regions by mean of a Zeppelin airship before undertaking to reach the pole. A craft of special strength will be built for the purpose and the expedition will be fitted out under the management of Count Zeppelin.
