TO JOIN TRACK TEAM RAIN SPOILS RACES

MILLER MAKES APPEARANCE ALMOST OBSCURE HORSES

Work of the "Little Giants" Star E. M. Fry, Heavily Played Favorite, Wins the Premier Stakes Quarter-Back Is Very Gratifying to Coach Cayou.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., Jan. 30.—There was rejoicing in athletic circles at Wabash College yesterday occasioned by the appearance of "Georgie" Miller the crack little quarter back of the football eleven, in track suit at the college gymnasium. Owing to the fact that he has been spending his spare time preparing for a debate, he had not joined the track team.

Despite the fact that he had not practiced pole vaulting for eight months he was able to clear the bar at an even ten feet. In four trials he made nine feet with ease and then the bar was raised to nine feet six inches. He made the height on the first trial and the bar was raised to the ten foot mark which he cleared on the first attempt. Considering that he has done absolutely no training for the event, the accomplishment was especially gratifying to Coach Cayou who is confident that Miller will be able to do eleven feet by the end of the season.

The appearance of Miller greatly strengthens the team as he is considered one of the best indoor hurdlers in the State. Pifer is clearing the bar around the ten-foot mark, and Coach Cayou expects to develop a pair of pole vaulters good for one, two, in most of the meets in which the local compete.

YELCH STAR OF MEET NOVELTIES IN CARS

SOPHOMORES IN VICTORY 1907 MODELS SHOW CHANGES

Interclass Contests at Indiana Very Gratifying—Juniors Capture Relay Race. American Manufacturers Have Brought Automobiles to an Almost Absolute Perfection.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Jan. 30.—The sophomores ran away with the interclass meet here tonight, piling up a score of 50 points, while the juniors made 36 and the freshmen secured 14. The seniors did not enter a team. The juniors made ten of their points by capturing the relay race. Harry Yelch of the sophomore class, who is the vaulty high jumper, was the star of the meet, making fourteen points. He captured first place in the high and standing broad jumps, took second in the pole vault and third in the shotput. "Boss" Williamson, the clever varsity sprinter, who was running under the banner of the sophomores, earned ten points for his team by his sprinting and hurdling. H. Johnson was the star performer for the freshmen. He took twelve of the fourteen points made by his team, and was also second in the individual honors. He won first place in the pole vault, second in the high jump, finished second in the high hurdles and secured a third out of the twenty-yard dash.

Some of the marks posted by the class athletes were very gratifying. Carr, the varsity miler, covered that distance in 20:35 without being pushed. Williamson made the quarter in 58, with Malott a close second. Yelch had little difficulty in the high jump, not being forced above 5 feet 4 inches. Each won the two-mile event in the time of 11:20. SERIES OF RACES TO BE HELD.

Arrangements for Yacht Contests Between American and German Boats.

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 30.—The first international contest between German and American yachts in German waters will be held next August, when another series of races for the so-called Sonier type of boat will be held at Kiel for a cup offered by the Emperor.

Arrangements for the races were perfected today by an interchange of cables between the United States Yacht Club and the Imperial Yacht Club and Henry Howard, chairman of the German-American race committee of the Eastern Yacht Club of the city. The races will begin on Aug. 15 and this country will be represented by three yachts, which will be selected by the German-American race committee.

The interchange of cables today settled a friendly controversy which has been in progress for two months between the officials of the two clubs as to the date of the races. The Germans desired the Americans to visit the country during the winter in June. The Americans, on the other hand, felt that it was too much to ask yachtsmen from Germany to make the long journey in winter in April for trial races during the first week in May in order to have the best of the German fleet on hand by the middle of June. The Germans waived the date and the rest follows.

The multiple disc clutch of the American yacht Vim won the Marblehead Cup. It is expected that the trial races for the American boats will be held at Marblehead in June.

SOUTH BEND SIGNS DEVORE. Central League Club Lands Star Pitcher From Pueblo (Colo.) Club.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Jan. 30.—South Bend today signed Charles A. Devore, a pitcher from Pueblo, Colo. Besides the local Central League team, Buffalo and Gagetown were after the player. Manager Grant will begin his season's work, will report in a few days. He has succeeded in coming to terms with First Baseman Ackemeier of Cincinnati.

Baseball fans were surprised today when it was announced that Teddy Price had been named by Wheeling to manage and captain the Storks this year. Price succeeded Schriver, who was hitting out for \$300 per month. Price three years ago managed the Wheeling team, but was deposited in favor of Schriver.

Besides appointing Price manager, the Wheeling Club has taken action, through President Carson of the Central League, by which the Hutchinson (Kan.) team will be disbanded from organized baseball; unless a satisfactory explanation is made to account for its failure.



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
