Seventy-Six of Ninety-Six F. A.
M. Endurance Run Contest-
ants Finish Perfect.

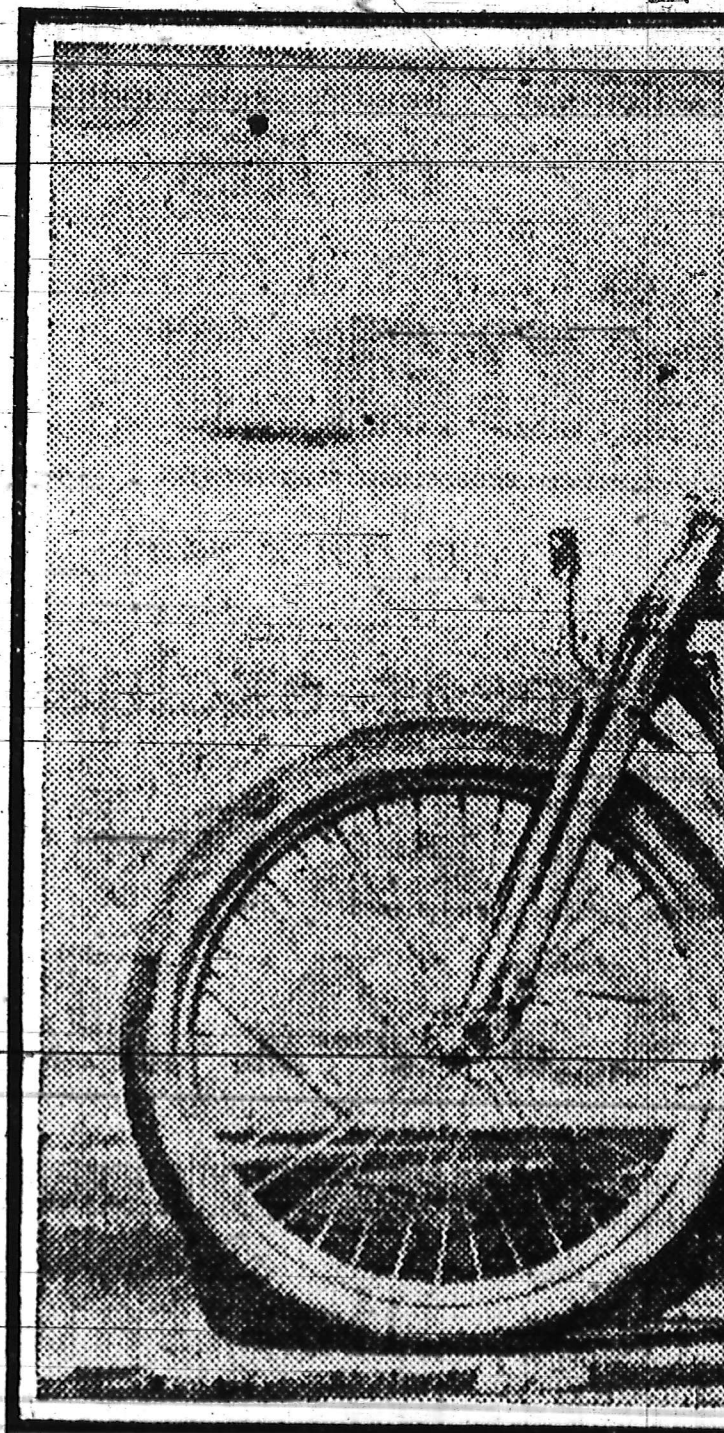
SAND DISMOUNTS RIDERS.

Unusually Fast Time Is Made
Despite Occasional Bad
Stretches of Road.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 10.—(Special)—
Seventy-six of the ninety-six contestants
in the eighth annual endurance run of the
Federation of American Motorcyclists fin-
ished with clean scores at Columbus, O.,
tonight after a hard run from Cleveland.
The start from Cleveland at 6 o'clock this
morning was marked by tremendous en-
thusiasm and the entire route was one of
continual celebration. Farmers and
small village inhabitants were out in hol-
iday spirits, greeting and cheering the
dust covered nerry two wheelers. Fol-
lowing is the list of cars that finished with
perfect scores on the first day: Reading
Standard, 12; Indian, 14; Marsh-Merz, 2;
Marvel, 1; Rellance, 5; Flying Merkel, 8;

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The journey was characterized by few accidents. About one dozen riders went into ditches, but serious damage did not result. Most all of the contestants arrived at every checking station ahead of the scheduled time. The confetti auto, with G. W. Stephens and G. H. Hamilton of Indianapolis, stayed about half an hour ahead of the caravan of cracking, spurting machines and blazed the trail. As soon as the pathfinding automobile had warned the country side that the "dare devils" were coming, the entire populace turned out. Farmers drove wagon loads of sightseers and stationed themselves beneath shade trees along the roads, others placed chairs in front of their home and children waved flags, while all along the route the greeting was uniform and profuse.

Roads Force Dismounting.

Some parts of the roads were so bad that the riders were forced to dismount and "walk" their machines through the deep sand. This caused them to increase their speed as soon as a clean stretch was found. Pedestrians and travelers along the roads cleared the track and gave them the right of way, driving into the ditches in order not to hinder the prize-seekers. In some instances the press automobile fell behind the cavalcade in order to pull the obliging travelers from out of the ditches. The press car is the Morgan-Wright Glidden tour machine. The occupants declare that the reception accorded the motorcyclists is as great as ever given a Glidden tour.

The Indianapolis contestants are holding their own alongside of far more experienced pilots. Harry Graff, on his Reading-Standard, was forced to wait several minutes at every checking station before he could proceed, being that much ahead of his schedule. This is his first tour.

Jack Rice also made an enviable run, coming in with a clean score. J. H. McLaughlin on his New Era demonstrated his ability to meet a crisis when he fractured the frame of his machine. He was twenty minutes ahead of time when his front wheel struck a brick, hurling him with great force to the ground. He found a carpenter and built a wooden support around the injured frame and proceeded, getting in here tonight on time. He will have to continue the run tomorrow with the patched car, as the rules will not permit an exchange of machines.

The tourists leave here in the morning at 6 o'clock, headed for Indianapolis. They expect to reach the site of their week's national convention about 5 o'clock. At Connersville, Ind., a hill-climbing test will be made.

MILTON MOKO'S NECK BROKEN

DRIVER POWELL IS SERIOUSLY INJURED IN COLLISION DURING THE SECOND HEAT OF PACING RACE AT LEBANON.

LEBANON, Ind., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—The opening day of the Interurban Circuit races was marred by an accident which resulted in the injury to K. Powell of Urbana, O., and the death of the horse he was driving, Milton Moko. On the stretch in the second heat of the three-year and under Membrane ran into the sulky of Milton Moko throwing the latter to the ground and overturning the sulky. Powell received several bad bruises and one leg was injured. Milton Moko's neck was broken.

Possibility easily won the three-year-old pace with Milton Moko out of the race. The 2:30 trot proved to be the best race of the afternoon. Motorcycle, owned by C. A. Chambers of Indianapolis, won in four heats. The first heat was very close, while Motorcycle easily won the second. There was scarcely a nose difference between Motorcycle and Miss Bryan in the third. Both drivers in this heat used their whips freely. The fourth heat was also very close. Summaries:

SEYMOUR HAS NARROW ESCAPE.

Meets With Mishap While Testing Race Machine on Speedway.

That the motorcycle races, to be held on the Motor Speedway Friday and Saturday of this week, will be filled with danger to the contestants was evidenced yesterday morning, when Ray Seymour had a narrow escape from probable death.

This 17-year-old record breaker was testing his swift two-wheeler, when he struck a small bump in the track and his machine suddenly lurched toward the high embankment on the curve. He had released his hold on the handle bars with one hand in order to oil his racer. Just a second's time saved him from plunging over the embankment. He threw his weight toward the inner side of the course and sent his machine at the rate of a mile a minute back on the track, barely missing the edge a few inches.

It is generally conceded that the track is not in as perfect condition now as it will be later when it is settled. While this has caused a small ripple of uneasiness among motorcycle circles, the rumors that the races will be held on the Fair Grounds track instead is entirely untrue. The big Speedway course is credited with being the finest in the world.

PARADE DRAWS INTEREST.
