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



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ORGANIZATION IS UNDER WAY

Move on Foot to Form Organization in This City to Be Composed of 25 Sunday Schools.

The league will not devote its attention to any one particular branch of athletics, but all departments will be given like attention and every class of

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
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Marmon Laking a Stage Grower

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
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
