Indianapolis, June 1.—Rene Thomas, French pilot, handling a French machine the Delage swept everything before him Satur day. 

Columbus, June 1 .-- Ohio State made a clean sweep of intercollegiate tennis medals by winning Saturday both the singles and doubles in the finals of play, for the first time in the records of Ohio. It fell to Wesleyan to donate the victim in the singles, while Denison furnished the opposition in the doubles.

In the doubles Ohio State met Denison players who had won their way to the final bracket by downing Oberlin without the loss of a game in the first round, and drawing a bye in the semi-finals. Therefore, when the battle began they started in the perfect condition gained by a full day's

In the first set Denison's freshness stood them so well in hand that they succeeded in downing the opponents by a score of 7-5.
