

# ARDSMEN CROWD NAVY

## NOT WELL AT CAMP PERRY

S FROM NEW YORK AND MASSA-  
USETTS VIE WITH CADETS IN  
NATIONAL RIFLE COM-  
PETITION.

CAMP PERRY, O., Aug. 23.—At the end of the second (600 yards) stage of the national rifle team match, which opened this morning on the 200 targets with forty-eight teams contesting for the national trophy, the United States navy is ahead by 1081, but Massachusetts is crowding with 1075 and New York with 1070. In the 200-yard shoot, which opened the match, the navy led, closely pushed by the police cadets, while at 600 yards the New York team, which came here with about a week's practice at Seagirt, pulled ahead of the navy for high score and pulled from ninth to third place.

Observers on the range today were Secretary of War Dickinson, who left this morning for Detroit, to return on Thursday; Lieut. Gen. J. C. Bates, U. S. A., rear admiral and Baron L. E. Bode, Russian military attache, and Maj. De Ville, Mexican military attache at Washington.

## JACKSON CO. MAKES PROTEST

LEADERS IN 300-MILE SPEEDWAY  
EVENT AT TIME OF STOP DEMAND  
VALUABLE PRIZE, AS  
OFFERED.

C. C. Rundell, local representative for the Jackson Automobile Company, has entered a protest for the big \$10,000 Wheeler-Schebler trophy which was offered as the prize for the race car that won the 300-mile event last Saturday during the Speedway motor carnival.

The Jackson car was leading the race, by a long streak of track, when the continued number of accidents caused the race officials to call off the event. This was in the 235th mile, with the Jackson in a safe lead, promising to take the prize by a walk-away, barring accidents.

The time for the Jackson at this stage of the race was 4:31:51 4-10. Lynch was driving at a winning clip. The Jackson people declare that they have won the valuable trophy, which is considered the finest ever offered during the history of sporting events.

### May Resort to A. A. A.

It is reported that the matter will be taken before the executive committee of the A. A. A., in case the donors of the gift and the Speedway management refuse to grant the trophy. Immediately after the races it was generally conceded that the 300-mile race would be put on the program in connection with the twenty-four-hour races to be held next month at the Speedway, after the track has been given extensive repairs.
