**TWO DAYS' PROGRAM TO BE GIVEN AT SPEEDWAY PROMISES TO AFFORD EXCELLENT SPORT FOR THE SPEED-MAD PUBLIC.**

Indications are that the big national motorcycle race meet to be held in this city Aug. 13 and 14 will be a record-breaker. The official program given out for the first time yesterday follows:

- Event 1—Five miles, limited to private owners.
- Event 2—One mile, F. A. M., national championship.
- Event 3—Five-mile handicap, limited to the members of Indiana Motorcycle Club.
- Event 4—Ten-mile F. A. M. national championship.
- Event 5—Five miles for machines less than 55 cubic inches piston displacement without exhaust ports.
- Event 6—Ten-mile professional.
- Event 7—Five-mile open handicap.
- Event 8—Twenty-five miles, open for machines less than 30½ inches piston displacement.

### SECOND DAY'S RACING.

- Event 1—Two and one-half-mile handicap, limited to private owners.
- Event 2—Five-mile national championship.
- Event 3—One-mile trials, flying start.
- Event 4—Ten-mile handicap.
- Event 5—Five-mile professional.
- Event 6—Ten miles, open to machines of less than 3½ cubic inches piston displacement.
- Event 7—One hour F. A. M. championship.
