

VANDERBILT CUP WINNER MAKES SPEEDWAY NOISE

HARRY GRANT IN ALCO SIX AND
OTHERS PRACTICE.

BIG PROGRAM FOR FIRST DAY

Harry Grant and his Alco "6," winner of last year's Vanderbilt cup race, made the big noise this morning in the trial practice at the Indianapolis motor speedway. Grant started putting his motor through the paces yesterday afternoon and has been on the track much of the time since. He made several laps of the course in 1:55, but says he has not let his big car out as yet. This is Grant's first appearance at the speedway and he is taking advantage of every opportunity to familiarize himself with the peculiarities of the brick course. Grant's car is entered in the Cobe trophy race on Monday.

Most of the cars at the speedway are rapidly rounding into shape for the opening of the three-day card on Friday. Past trials marked the tryouts yesterday afternoon and this morning. The big cars set a fast pace for the smaller ones, but the steady grind of the latter indicates that spirited competition will result in the events for the little fellows.

Hearne and Benz on Scene.

Eddie Hearne, of Chicago, appeared on the track this morning in his 120-horse power Benz. The car arrived from Chicago last night, and the time this morning was spent in tuning up the motor and getting it in shape. Hearne also has the Diamond T, a Chicago car, at the track.

One of the features in connection with the workouts this morning was the arrival on the course of Louis Chevrolet and Bob Burman with their Buick Specials. These were to receive their first workouts this afternoon. Arthur Chevrolet was one of the consistent performers in the trial practice yesterday, the Franco-Swiss sending his Buick "16" around for laps in 1:55 and 1:54 in two tryouts.

Bedient and Edmonds, in their Cole "6" entries, worked out yesterday like a pair of Siamese twins. Their cars maintained a steady, even pace throughout the afternoon and were never far apart. The two Black Crow cars arrived at the course yesterday and were given their initial tryouts.

BURNS SAYS JOHNSON WILL SHOW STREAK OF YELLOW

Will Challenge Negro If He Wins, but Would Not Meet Jeffries.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Tommy Burns, from whom Jack Johnson won the heavyweight championship, and who arrived here yesterday on the steamship Wilhelmina from Australia, declares that Johnson is going to get the beating of his life when he faces Jeffries in the arena at Reno on July 4. Burns also brought over the news that Johnson is a strong favorite in the betting in Sydney and other sport centers of Australia.

"Johnson may be game against little men like Ketchel and myself," said Burns, "but he will show the yellow streak when Jeffries lands a few hard punches to the stomach. If Johnson should happen to win, I will challenge him at the ringside, but I would not think of going against a man like Jeffries."

Although the betting was 10 to 8 in favor of Johnson when Burns left Australia, he bet \$500 on shipboard with Hugh McIntosh, the big fight promoter of Australia, that Jeffries would win, thinking at the time he was getting the worst of the odds. McIntosh believes Jeffries can not come back and that Johnson will win inside of twenty rounds. Heavyweight champion Bill Lange, of Australia, is also a pronounced Johnson advocate.
