OLDFIELD AT PARKERSBURG

Speed King Will Attempt to Lower Half Mile Mark.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., July 15.—Barney Oldfield, who holds every world's automobile record from one to fifty miles, except the mark for ten and twenty-five miles, will appear in Parkersburg on July 21, where on the Shaker park course he will attempt to lower the half-mile mark. The track is considered one of the fastest in the country, and experts predict that Oldfield will be successful in his effort.

Oldfield will drive his famous 200-horse-power Irene racer, the fastest car in the world. A mile in 21.5 seconds at Orono, Wash., Florida, is the record of Oldfield and his car. This is equal to 140 miles an hour. Following are some of Oldfield's records: Mile straightaway, 27.15 seconds; mile, Indianapolis, on two-miler and a-half speedway, 55.1-5 seconds; mile on track, St. Paul, 49.15 seconds; mile on a half-mile track, Findlay, O., 59 seconds.
