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SPEEDWAY DRIVERS ALL SET FOR TRIALS

International Sweepstakes En-
trants Must Turn Quarter Mile
at 75 Miles an Hour.

BURMAN TO RACE FOR CHARITY

Attempt to Shatter Standing Rec-
ords of Course Will Take
Place Monday.

Entrants to the 500-mile International Sweepstakes race worked late last night at the Speedway preparing for the time trials at 9 o'clock this morning, to determine the starters in the race.

Every car entered to qualify must be able to make a speed of seventy-five miles an hour for a quarter of a mile. The cars will have a flying start and the timing will be done on the home stretch. The Warner barograph, in the charge of C. H. Warner, was put in place yesterday afternoon and everything is in readiness for the trials this morning. With the number of cars entered it will probably require all day to finish the trials.

Bob Burman, holder of the straightaway records for the kilometer, mile and two-mile marks, will not drive his time trials to set new Speedway records at 9 o'clock the day of the race, but the event will be staged Monday morning at 1 o'clock. At the request of the manufacturers who have entered the race and under the rules of the A. A. A. the trials were set one day earlier, as the rules say that the sanction for the race can not be changed after the issue unless the contest board gives its consent and the makers entered felt that they were entitled to all the publicity the day of the race.

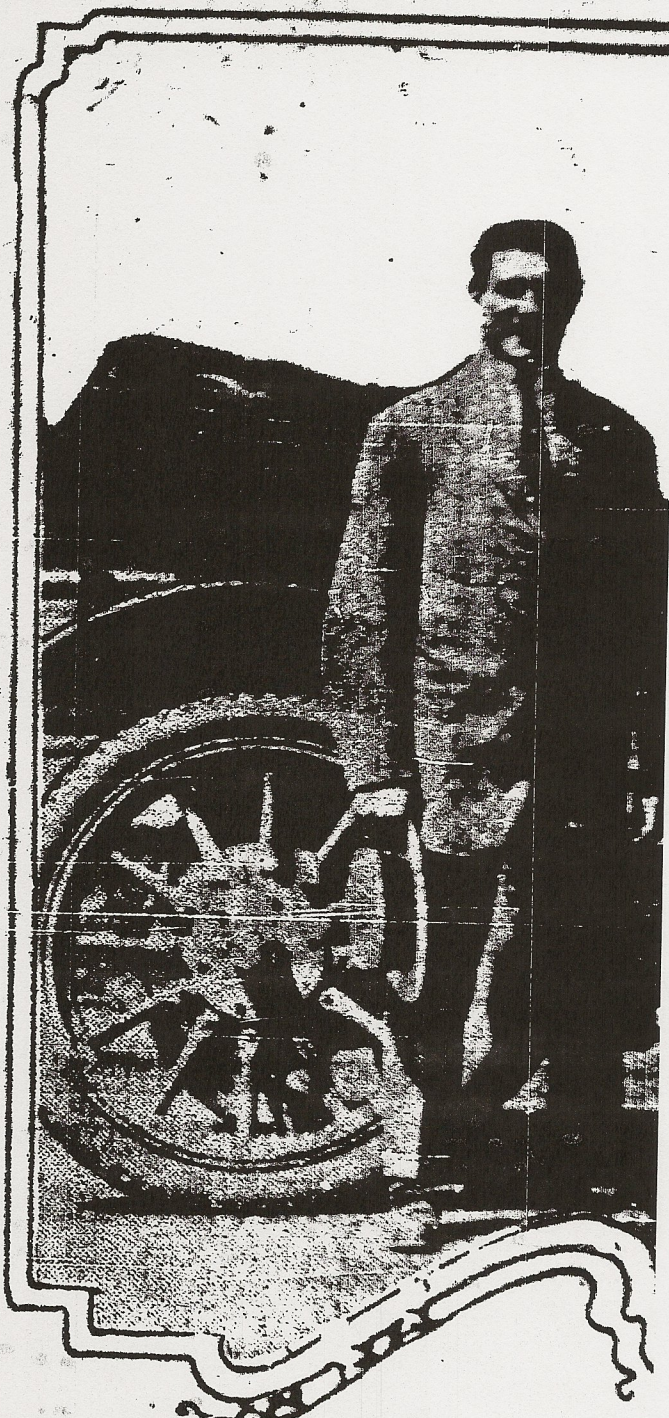
The proceeds of the time trials will be given to charity by the Speedway management and the admission charged will be 50 cents. The A. A. A. has issued a special sanction for the trials and Burman will probably hold all the Speedway records for the distance as well as the straightaway marks Monday.

All of the A. A. A. officials who will have charge of the running off of the 500-mile event arrived yesterday. Fred J. Wagner, the starter, who came in Wednesday, was joined by S. M. Butler, chairman of the contest board, A. R. Pardington, referee, and Col. C. H. Warner, who will have charge of the timing of the race.

DRIVERS EASE UP MOTORS.

The drivers did not work hard yesterday at the track, although a few of the pilots turned off some fast miles. Most of the drivers seemed to be nursing their motors for the record trials today. Joe Dawson in a Marmon drove two laps in 1:46 and Harroun, his teammate, averaged 1:51 for several laps. Teddy Tetzlaff in a Lozier, drove six laps at an average of 1:57, four at 1:53 and made his best lap in 1:50. Caleb Bragg was not pushing his motor, and for ten laps averaged 2:00. Ralph Beardsley was pushing his Simplex around the track the greater part of the day, averaging close to 2:05. Johnny Aitken in a National averaged 1:59 for seven laps, doing his best lap in 1:54.

The track will be closed Sunday to the public and a force of men will be put to work scouring the track with lye and afterward the courses will be washed with water. The drivers will be permitted to practice tomorrow and Monday morning preceding Burman's time trials, and after the trials until noon. Then the track will be closed until the race is launched at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning. Preceding the race the drivers will be introduced to the crowd by the announcers and a parade, the speed not to exceed twenty miles an hour, will be held. Sunday the ushers will be drilled by David Wallace, Capt. Carpenter will have his Speedway guards out and they will also be drilled and assigned to their posts.

Al Greiner, the young Chicago millionaire, disclaims any heroism in taking the wheel of the Amplex car No. 44, which has been termed the "hoodoo" car. "Mine is not the car that gave Joe Horan his quietus, for that was No. 12. I am satisfied," said Greiner, "that I have a car as fast as any on the Speedway and it is my intention to settle down to 75 miles per hour and maintain that speed throughout the race. Of course I have other plans for running the race, but with forty or more other contestants there will not be possible at all times."

Greiner knows the Speedway if any one does, for last year he started fourteen times in events on the course and won eight firsts, two seconds and one third, being placed in eleven of fourteen races. During the year he also won six firsts in six starts at the Algonquin Hill Climb in Illinois and broke the record of both hills, holding both records still.

In the Elgin road race he gained fourth in the first day's race and third in the second day's contest and with the same car.

Joe Horan, who met with an accident Wednesday, was resting easy yesterday at the Methodist Hospital. Many race drivers and representatives of tire, oil and other interested companies, visited the driver. Horan will be laid up for some time, but says that the incident will rob him of none of his nerve.
