## WILL QUIT SPEEDWAY BY AIR

### BUMBAUGH TO TRY NEW GIANT

Arranges for Long Trip in Big Balloon  
Immediately After 500-Mile  
Auto Race.

Before a crowd that, it is estimated, will exceed 100,000 people, the giant balloon, Duesseldorfer, will ascend Tuesday afternoon at about 4 o'clock from the Speedway. The ascension will take place immediately after the close of the 500-mile auto race. It will be the climax of a day of excitement for spectators who will have gathered from every part of the country.

The Duesseldorfer is the most recent "creation" of Capt. G. L. Bumbaugh, of national fame as an aviator. Capt. Bumbaugh has been at work all winter building the monster. The piecing together of the silk was done at the Speedway and the varnishing and general after-touches were done under the shelter of the Studebaker building at the Fair Grounds. Capt. Bumbaugh is confident that the initial tryout will demonstrate that he has a real conqueror of the air fit to enter any of the contests that may be planned for the summer.

Capt. Bumbaugh has invited each of the Indianapolis newspapers to send a representative. The Duesseldorfer is capable of taking care of six or eight passengers comfortably. Albert Lieber, president of the Indianapolis Brewing Company, will be one of the party. The full list of guests has not been made up, but the party will number not less than five.

The extent of the trip will depend largely on circumstances. If the weather is favorable and the passengers consent, Capt. Bumbaugh will not object to an all-night ride. This probably would see the end of the balloon's journey somewhere in Kentucky or another adjoining state. If conditions are not favorable, the trip will be cut short and a descent will be made after a three or four hours' journey. Plans are being made for a trip of at least 150 miles. Will H. Brown, president of the Mals Motor Truck Company, has offered the use of two automobile trucks which will endeavor to follow the route of the balloon for at least 200 miles. If the trucks can keep in touch, immediately after descent the balloon will be folded up and brought back to the city along with the air travelers.

#### EXPECTS TO MAKE RECORD.

"I am very proud of the Duesseldorfer," said Capt. Bumbaugh, "and I believe it will make a great record in the

aviation field. We have put the very best stuff into it, thanks to the generosity of Mr. Lieber, and it ought to be a world-beater. The balloon holds 80,000 cubic feet of gas without undue pressure, and this is sufficient to keep a party of four in the air along with seventeen sandbags for ten or twelve hours. If the party should be enlarged to seven or eight we shall pump a few thousand extra feet of gas into the bag and that will take care of us comfortably.

"Just where the winds will take us, of course, I can not say. But if we make an all-night trip of it, we ought to be a considerable distance into the Southland when we descend. The trip promises to be especially delightful this time of the year. If the air currents are gentle we can float along two or three thousand feet above the earth until sundown and then suddenly rise to ten or twelve thousand feet and see the sun setting far above the clouds."

Capt. Bumbaugh expects to use the Duesseldorfer for a number of pleasure trips during the season. Several balloon parties have been planned for the giant ship should the initial trip prove successful.

## SEEKS TO OUST TELEPHONES.

Portland, Ind., Sues Home Company, Alleging Lack of Franchise.

**PORTLAND, Ind., May 27.**—Sult has been filed in the Jay Circuit Court by the city of Portland, seeking to oust the Home Telephone Company of this city from the streets and alleys. It is alleged that the company is operating without a franchise. This suit follows the recent ruling of Judge C. E. Sturgis of Bluffton, who was called as special judge in the case, that a suit started early in January by the state, on relation of the prosecuting attorney, was brought by the wrong party. The suit followed a raise by the company, effective Jan. 1, of its rates for service. The franchise originally granted to the company was as a partnership, but it says it operates under a franchise obtained by the purchase of the rights of the old Portland Telephone Company, which was in business here many years ago. The present company's original franchise limited the fee to be charged, but that of the Portland Company did not.

## CORNER STONE WILL BE LAID.

Evening Ceremonies Arranged for New Church at Portland, Ind.

**PORTLAND, Ind., May 27.**—Next Thursday evening at 7 o'clock the corner stone of the new West Walnut Street Church of Christ will be laid. It had been expected that the corner stone would be laid Sunday, but delay in the arrival of brick prevented. A false floor will be laid on the main auditorium floor, and chairs and electric lights will be provided. The regular weekly prayer service will be held there at the same time.
