

The third and final day of the 1000 . auguration automobile frace mest at the Indianapolis motor speedway was a fitting climax to one of the most successful events of the kind ever held anywhere. Records were shattered right and left be fore a record breaking crowd, estimated at sixty thousand people, and there was not an accident of any kind to mar the afternoon's sport. 
Mile Record Reduced.
