


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## VISITORS VICTIMS OF BOLD "CROOKS"

Pickpockets Get Many Valuables  
and Large Amount of Money  
From Vast Crowd.

### DARING HELD NO BOUNDS

Diamond Stud Is Stolen From  
Spectator's Shirt During  
Race at Speedway.

Indianapolis yesterday not only was the haven for many thousands of Speedway visitors, but many "crooks" as well, and hundreds of dollars in money and valuables are included in the long list of thefts reported to the police last night and early this morning. Several big "hauls" were made at the Union Station, where thousands of persons congregated during the morning awaiting trains for the race track.

Many plain clothesmen were on duty at the station and the Speedway, but experienced little difficulty in handling the vast throngs.

Business with the pickpockets was good at the Speedway also and several big thefts were committed there. The most daring was the one in which William Everly of Plymouth, Ind., was victim. While Mr. Everly stood up in his seat and ordered two glasses of lemonade from the vender in the grand stand, a thief loosened his diamond stud pin and escaped. The prints left by the thief's fingers still were visible when Mr. Everly reported the matter to Captain of Detectives Holtz at police headquarters in the evening.

### LOSES \$450 AT SPEEDWAY.

Another heavy loser at the Speedway was E. W. Arbogast of Anderson, Ind., who lost his pocketbook containing endorsed checks for \$400 and \$50 in cash. The purse was taken from his hip pocket and was not missed until he arrived at his home in Anderson.

The daring of the crooks knew no bounds and purse-snatching was resorted to late in the evening. A woman who refused to give her name, while sitting in front of the Marion Club, on North Meridian street, was attacked by an unidentified man and robbed of her handbag containing \$1. The thief, pursued by several men who witnessed the robbery, ran south through the city.

Two other robberies, one occurring at the Union Station in the morning when the rush for the Speedway trains was at its height, Ernest Paulsen of Guadalajara, Mexico, reported that he lost a pocketbook containing \$500. He was unable to furnish any description of the thief.


**PURSE SNATCHERS.**

**DUESSELDORFER MAKES TRIP LANDS IN HENDRICKS COUNTY**

**Capt. G. L. Bumbaugh Pilots New Aerial Cruiser in Maiden Voyage From Speedway.**

"The balloon Duesseldorfer, which ascended from the Speedway at 8:35 o'clock yesterday afternoon during the big race, descended in Hendricks County, twenty miles from Indianapolis, shortly after 7 o'clock. The trip was without exciting incident.

The highest altitude shown by the staltoscope was a little over 9,000 feet at 6:15 o'clock. This was above the cloud line. Capt. G. L. Bumbaugh did not like the appearance of the clouds, which threatened rain, and he descended to about 3,000 feet for the rest of the trip to be on the safe side in case of a storm. Those who made the trip in addition to Capt. Bumbaugh were A. W. De La Poer of the New England Selling Company, New York; Frank B. Hill of the Overland Auto Company and John M. Maxwell of The Indianapolis Star.

Mr. De la Poer acted as the personnel and business representative of Albert Lieber and the Indianapolis Brewing Company.
