

INDIANS STRUGGLING FOR TAIL-END HONORS

DROP BOTH GAMES OF DOUBLE-HEADER WITH SENATORS

ERRORS HANDICAP LINKE

The Indians made another rally in their fight for the tail-end flag of the American Association yesterday afternoon, by allowing the Senators to walk away with both games of the double-header, the scores being 4 to 1 and 4 to 2, respectively. Incidentally the Colonials, who are struggling for the honor with the Indians, lost two games to the Mud Hens, thus leaving the Indians a greater field in the first game Saturday afternoon. In the first game Saturday afternoon the Indians were walloped by the team of 12 to 1, the visitors making twenty safe hits off Hardgrove, Merz and Hixon. In the second game, a six-inning contest, the Indians had luck thrust upon them, and they won by making three runs in the last frame, following a boost of the ball by Keene, who was running to first.

Linke is Handicapped.

Linke, the pitcher who came to us from the St. Louis Browns American League team a few days ago, made his debut in the first Sunday contest, and while he pitched a fairly good game, his support was poor. Six errors marked the work of the Indians, and the six runs made by the Senators were off eight scattered hits, and the blame for the errors was directly responsible for as many runs. The Indians failed to hit Sitten effectively. After bunting three hits and making their only run in the first frame, Sitten held the Indians to two hits during the balance of the game. The visitors got three tallies in the first two in the seventh and one in the ninth. Carr made three of the four hits credited to the Indians.

The second contest was a beautiful game, not an error marking the work of either team. Otto Merz was in the box for seven and a half innings. The Indians bunched four hits for as many as winning a victory that seemed to belong to the Indians. Hardgrove finished the game for Merz. The trio scored only in the third inning of this game, and after that Liehardt pitched the kind of ball that prevented an Indian from reaching first base.

BIG BENZ AND NATIONAL FIRST IN CENTURY RUNS

WIN RESPECTIVE EVENTS AT
MOTOR SPEEDWAY.

WESTCOTT SHOWING PLEASES

Out of the half hundred drivers that were scheduled to face starter Fred Wagner in the various events at the Indianapolis motor speedway, this afternoon, at least four of the number expected to enter the fray with a confidence born of victory. They were Eddie Hearne, pilot of the big German Benz; Harry Knight in a Westcott, Howard Wilcox and Charles Merz in Nationals. Hearne and Knight finished first and second, respectively, in the first of the two 100-mile events Saturday, while Wilcox and Merz, in the order named, led the field at the finish of the 100-mile grind for the Bemy grand brassard and trophy.

Hearne, in his 120-horse power Benz, took the lead at the start of the first century grind and was never headed. His only stop during the race was near the seventy-fifth mile to take an oil. More remarkable even than the showing of the winner was the victory achieved by young Harry Knight, who piloted his Westcott car into second place. With experience gained in only one previous race and an A. A. A. driver's license one day old, the Indianapolis youngster by a steady, consistent drive brought his car from far back in the field up to second place at the finish. Knight drove the entire distance without a stop. Al Livingston in a National was third in the race and Harroun in a Marmon fourth.




