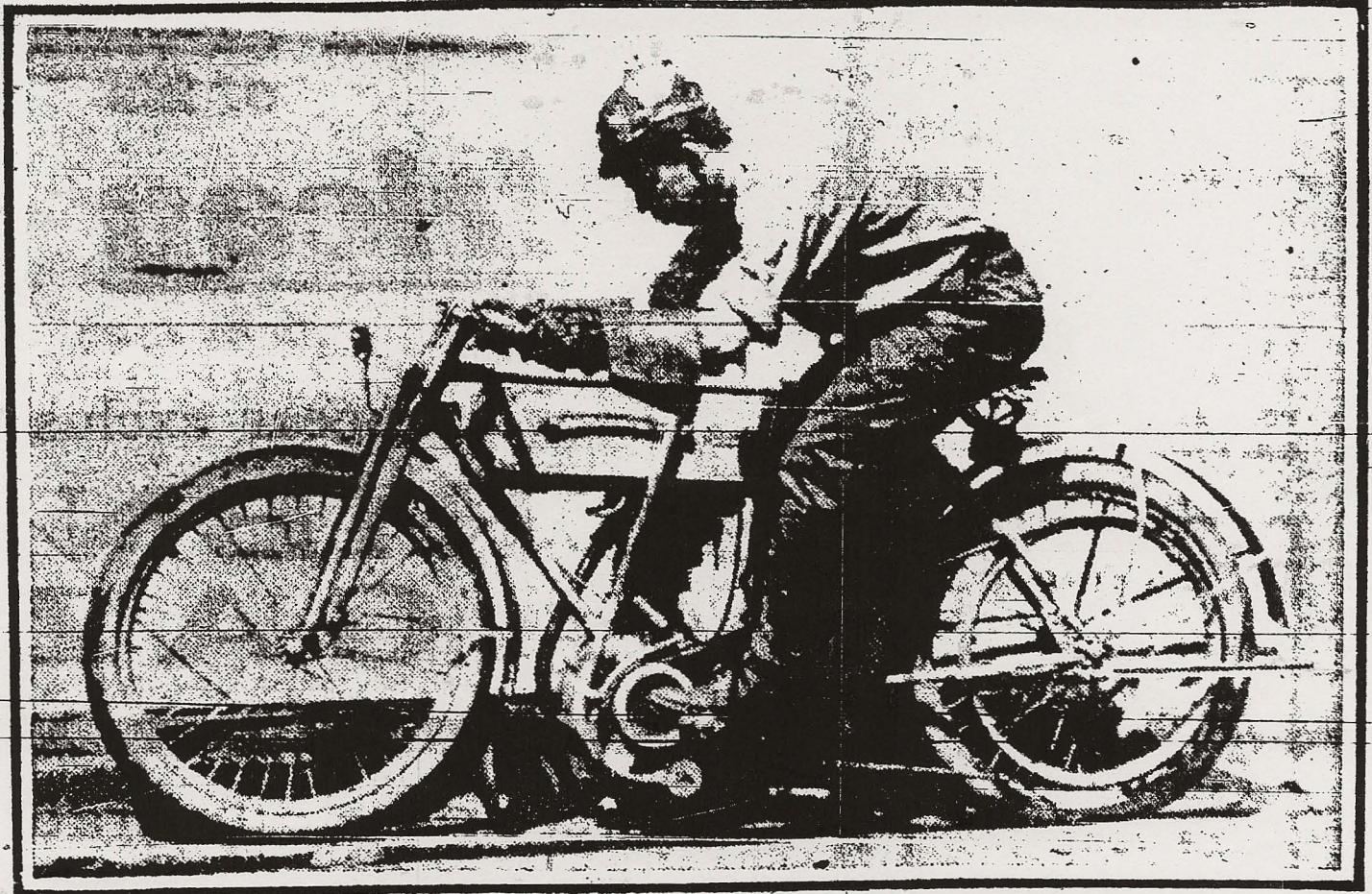

CYCLISTS COMPLETE FIRST DAY'S TOUR

Seventy-Six of Ninety-Six F. A.
M. Endurance Run Contest-
ants Finish Perfect.

SAND DISMOUNTS RIDERS

Unusually Fast Time Is Made
Despite Occasional Bad
Stretches of Road.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—
Seventy-six of the ninety-six contestants
in the eighth annual endurance run of the
Federation of American Motorcyclists fin-
ished with clean scores at Columbus, O.,
tonight after a hard run from Cleveland.
The start from Cleveland at 6 o'clock this
morning was marked by tremendous en-
thusiasm and the entire route was one of
continual celebration. Farmers and
small village inhabitants were out in hol-
day spirits, greeting and cheering the
just covered nerry two wheelers. Fol-
lowing is the list of cars that finished with
perfect scores on the first day: Reading
Standard, 12; Indian, 14; Marsh-Mors, 2;
Marvel, 1; Rollance, 5; Flying Merkel, 8;
S. S. U., 4; Thor, 6; Pierce, 2; New Era,
3; Yale, 3; Excelsior, 4; Harley Davidson,
3; Emblem, 3; Kiefler, 1; Torpedo, 1, and

accidents. About one dozen riders went
into ditches, but serious damage did not
result. Most all of the contestants ar-
rived at every checking station ahead of
the scheduled time. The confetti auto,
with G. W. Stephens and G. H. Hamil-
ton of Indianapolis, stayed about half an
hour ahead of the caravan of cracking,
spurring machines and blazed the trail.
As soon as the pathfinding automobile
had warned the country side that the
dare devils' were coming, the entire
corulace turned out. Farmers drove
wagon loads of sightseers and stationed
themselves beneath shade trees along the
roads, others placed chairs in front of
their home and children waved flags,
while all along the route the greeting
was uniform and profuse.

Roads Force Dismounting.
Some parts of the roads were so bad
that the riders were forced to dismount
and "walk" their machines through the
deep sand. This caused them to increase
their speed as soon as a clean stretch was
found. Pedestrians and travelers along
the roads cleared the track and gave them
the right of way driving into the ditches
in order not to hinder the prize-seekers.
In some instances the press automobile
fell behind the cavalcade in order to pull
the oblliging travelers from out of the
ditches. The press car is the Morgan-

 tomorrow with the patched car, as the
 rules will not permit an exchange of
 machines.

SEYMOUR HAS NARROW ESCAPE.

Meets With Mishap While Testing Race Machine on Speedway.

That the motorcycle races, to be held on
 the Motor Speedway Friday and Saturday of
 this week, will be filled with danger to the
 contestants was evidenced yesterday morn-
 ing, when Ray Seymour had a narrow escape
 from probable death.
 This 17-year-old record breaker was testing
 his swift two-wheeler, when he struck a
 small bump in the track and his machine
 suddenly lurched toward the high embank-
 ment on the curve. He had released his hold
 on the handle bars with one hand in order
 to oil his racer. Just a second's time saved
 him from plunging over the embankment.
 He threw his weight toward the inner side
 of the course and sent his machine at the
 rate of a mile a minute back on the track,
 barely missing the edge a few inches.
 It is generally conceded that the track is
 not in as perfect condition now as it will be
 when it is settled. While this has
 caused a small ripple of uneasiness among
 motorcycle circles, the rumors that the races
 will be held on the Fair Grounds track in-
 stead is entirely untrue. The big Speedway
 course is credited with being the finest in
 the world.

PARADE DRAWS INTEREST.

Local Motorcyclists Enlist in Ranks of Big Cycle Procession.

The parade by the motor cycle riders to
 be held here Thursday afternoon will be
 one of the most interesting features of the
 A. M. meet. Hundreds of riders will be
 in line with their machines decorated. All
 makes and styles will be in line, and it is
 expected that some of the old-style ma-
 chines will take part simply to show the
 advance of the motorcycle. R. C. Hanson,
 who rides a Reading Standard, promises to
 appear with one of the most unique outfits
 ever seen on a motorcycle. He is one of the
 oldest riders in the country, and has trav-
 eled the United States from coast to coast.
 W. H. Remphis, president of the R. S.
 factory, is here, and is the first representa-
 tive of the big factories to reach this city.
 The parade starts from the Circle and it is
 the desire of the boosters that every owner of
 a machine will join. The prospects are very
 bright that the local candidates for national
 honors will be elected. The races will take
 place at the Speedway Friday and Satur-
 day.
