Many Thrills in Game With Mill

GREINER WILL PILOT AMPLEX

Car Skids in Tuning Up at Track; Driver Suffers Broken Leg.

Participation of another star driver in the 500-mile \$40,000 race at the Indianapolis speedway on Memorial day was assured Thursday when Arthur Greiner was named as pilot of one of the big cars.

Greiner was given a place on the Amplex team, notification of his selection coming in a telegram from Manager George Salzman, who urged the local pilot to leave Chicago for Indianapolis at once in order that he might become familiar with the car to which he has been assigned.

"Wild Bob" Burman, world's champion driver, arrived here Thursday with his Benz car, which he will pilot in the sweepstakes race Tuesday. In tuning up the Benz at the speedway the hood melted from the heat of the engines. The car took fire, but was extinguished before severe damage was done.

All of the drivers are now at the track. Gil Anderson circled the two-and-a-half-mile course Wednesday afternoon in a Stutz car in 1:46. David Bruce-Brown, in a Fiat, made the same distance in 1:37. Fred Belcher, in a Knox, drove 185 miles, changing tires three times and averaging 1:49 for each lap.

An Amplex racing car, driven by Joe Horan of New York skidded and turned over while going at high speed Wednesday and Horan suffered a broken leg. His mechanic, Emmett Ward, was badly bruised.

Spencer Wishart in his Mercedes, with Herb Meek holding the injured driver in his arms, brought Horan to the speedway office and the ambulance took him to the Methodist hospital. W. H. Turner, the regular driver of the car, said last night that he would have the car in shape for the trials tomorrow. Fred J. Wagner, the official starter of the race, came in from New York. Wagner held a conference with Carl G. Fisher and arranged several of the details of the starting and running of the big race. He will give instructions to the drivers Saturday. Ray Harroun in his Marmon "Wasp" drove eighteen laps at a speed of 78 miles per hour and turned one lap at 81.5 miles per hour. Joe Dawson, his teammate, drove three laps at an average of 1:49. Frank Fox in a Pope-Hartford averaged 1:51.5 for eight laps.

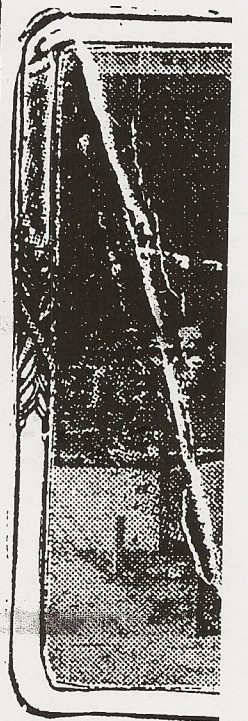
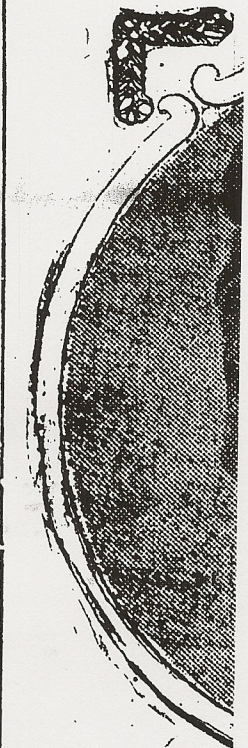
