HUNGER PANGS HIT ALL CLASSES ALIKE

Monopoly Shoots Prices of Food High—Rich Men Wait Their Turn.

There was excitement of many kinds
at the speedway Tuesday for the crowd
other than watching the drivers in their
efforts to win the great race. Among other
things the problem of getting something
to eat and drink was exciting.

One hundred thousand spectators, after
watching the race for several hours, real-
ized their hunger and from 12 until 2 p. m.
a steady stream of customers to the vari-
ous stands in the grounds was the result.
The supplies in the stands ran low and
hurry calls were sent to Indianapolis for
sandwiches, fruit and pies.

The stand keepers, realizing they had a
monopoly, raised the prices until every-
thing was at a premium. At 2 p. m. com-
mon bread ham sandwiches sold for
25 cents, cheese sandwiches 15 cents, box
lunches, similar to boxes to be purchased
from any restaurant at 15 cents, sold for
50 to 75 cents.

The sun beat down on the crowd with
such relentless fury the supply of water
in the few wells was not sufficient. Lines
a block long formed at the wells. Many
lucky persons getting the water filled bot-
tles and sold it for 10 cents a glass or
25 cents a bottle. Lemonade, so the stand
keepers called it, sold for 10 and 15 cents
a glass.

The lines in front of the stands never
grew small, and millionaire and clerk, so-
ciety favorite and stenographer stood in
their places waiting to be served with any
old thing to eat and at any old price.
