SEVEN INJURED IN AUTO WRECK

Frightful Accident at the County Fair Grounds Wednesday Which May Result in Loss of Life.

The opening day of the county fair was marred by a terrible automobile accident late in the afternoon which resulted in the injury of seven persons, one of whom is in a critical condition at the Good Samaritan hospital and surgeons entertain but slight hopes for his recovery.

The accident happened about 4:30 o'clock when one of the big automobiles was making a practice? spin around the track, prior to the autorace. An event or exhibition which the people had anxiously awaited, and so practically all the visitors at the fair were lined up around the race track.

The large 3,000 pound auto, a big "green" machine driven by C. D. Fisher of Indianapolis with Earl Klass of Dayton steering, became unmain ageable, owing to a defective tire, and dashed through the fence and into the crowd, hurling human beings right and left, from its path while scores of other people frantically rushed over each other in the efforts to get away from the monster.

The car was moving at a rate of about 40 miles an hour when the tree oxploded, but the driver successed in reducing the speed about one half before the machine became entirely unmanageable.

more or less injured.
